

Curriculum and Assessment Department News

It goes without saying, what a 2020 year we had. While we are still waiting for direction from the California Department of Education in regards to how exactly state assessments will be administered, there are a few things we can share.

CAASPP Testing will take place this year with two **possible** options for our students. CDE (California Department of Education) is currently developing the process for students to be able to test remotely using a computer device. We will also have physical locations available for testing. Following are our two **possible** options for testing this year (please note, the state is developing guidelines and this information is subject change based on state guidelines and local health requirements). Please remember this assessment is not only a vital tool for making instructional decisions about your student's education, but it is imperative for the success of our schools. Also, as a reminder, **all** students in grades 3-8 and 11-12 will be **required** to complete the school mandatory assessment in one of the below ways. ***The school mandatory assessment, however, is waived if students complete the state CAASPP assessment. We need everyone to test so we can get our percentage required by the state.***

1. **In Person CAASPP Testing:** Students will test at one of our Resource Centers or regional Test Sites in very small groups with their siblings or CWCS friends whom they have already been in contact with (and are comfortable with), or in small groups of ten students or less. The classrooms will be sanitized according to CDC (Center for Disease Control) guidelines, masks will be worn by students and staff, gloves will be available, and hand washing stations will be provided and monitored. Students will be required to have a CWCS [Parent/Guardian Assumption of Risk](#) waiver on file prior to entering the building. Additionally, all students and staff will have their temperature checked upon arrival along with being asked the CWCS Check-in Survey Questions as designated in the [Protocol for Visiting School Facilities During COVID-19 Pandemic](#). CDC guidelines will be followed to help prevent transmission/infection of COVID-19.
2. **Remote Testing:** Students will test in their home remotely, using school-owned computers that have had the necessary technology updates for the CAASPP portal to be available. ES test proctors will stay online with the student during the whole test, observing via a live camera feed. Students can communicate with the ES as needed and within test protocol. Students will need a quiet, uninterrupted place to test in the home. No persons can be in camera view range during the duration of the test.

The CDE has confirmed that the Computer Adaptive Test (CAT) portion of the English Language Arts and Math CAASPP have been modified to about half the usual time estimates for completion. It is estimated that students will take approximately 45-60 minutes to complete the CAT in English Language Arts, with an additional Performance Task, and 45-60 minutes to complete the CAT in Math, with an additional Performance Task.



How to Prepare Your Child for the CAASPP:

We highly recommend and ask that all students in grades 3-8 and grade 11 to complete the Smarter Balanced Practice and Training Tests at home with their parents. This will help them to be better prepared for the test so they can do their very best for themselves and for the school. Additionally, all 12th graders must complete the California Science Test (CST) practice assessment. Use of the Smarter Balanced practice and training tests for English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics will help familiarize students and their families with the testing interface, the format and type of questions, and the available accessibility resources. The practice tests may also form the foundation of a good “family conversation” and may help you create instructional materials to use at home with your students. Students who complete the practice test and know what to expect have less anxiety and feel more confident on test day, helping them perform better overall.
