Course Description

Course overview:

Unit III- Sample Assignment- Studio Experience Architectural Collage

Students will draw a series of sketches of their school environment. Then they will select the most interesting composition and draw it to actual size on a sheet of newsprint. Then they will transfer the drawing to a sheet of mat board. There the student will take the transferred material and use collage

materials: magazines, wallpaper remnants, construction paper, newspaper, and foils to fill in the shapes of their drawing.

Student Outcomes: To explore abstract design and composition in an architectural setting, identify and architectural composition with a focal point, secondary shapes, and large simple shapes, and develop abstract collage based on their composition.

Unit IV-Sample Assignment-Studio Experience-Modern-Day Egyptian Wall Painting

Students will create a series of thumbnail sketches of a single composition incorporating answers to questions that were most important to the student. Then, students will create a rock-like texture using aluminum foils, newspaper, and plaster craft. Once dried, students will use acrylics to stain the slab and transfer their drawings.

Student Outcomes: To complete a personal inventory through answering right questions verbally and visually, create a design that incorporates symbols and other images representing "ideal life", and produce a slab-like Egyptian-style painting that expresses the emotional and spiritual essence of student's existence.
